#### **CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT**

The year covered in this report, 2018/2019, was our first year as a fully funded Carer Advocacy Service. And what a year it has been – with increases in staff numbers, membership, services, workload, engagement and impact.

The following report sets out comprehensively all that we have attempted and achieved. It is an extraordinary list – particularly considering our (still) limited resources. I would like to highlight some of the notable achievements of the year and thank some of the many people responsible for our success.

- Our CEOs. Amanda Porter left us in December 2018. It was Amanda who
  wrote the tender that secured our 3 year funding. Our organisation
  would be profoundly different without her incredible work. Fiona
  Endacott stepped up into the role in March 2019 and has lifted CF&KCSA to the next level with her energy and passion. We are indebted to
  both these women.
- Our staff. Faced not just with a newly funded organisation, but with a new and complex legislative framework and huge increase in enquiry numbers, our staff have completely risen to the occasion. It has been inspiring to watch the way they have worked, independently and together, to improve the lot of Carers in SA – particularly through the flexing of Carers' new legal rights to have DCP decisions reviewed. This work is new, and hard. All parties (DCP, the South Australian Civil and Administrative Tribunal, Carers and CF&KC-SA are learning 'on the job'. Our Advocates have been determined and brave – and their work is bearing fruit. Particular thanks also go to our longest standing employee Natalie Baron, Administration and Events Coordinator. Natalie is responsible for everything thing from organising Recharge (Nathan Wallis!) and the Family Fun Day (at the Beachouse) to managing communications, ordering stationary and distributing almost \$18,000 worth of donated free tickets. You name it, she does it. We would be lost without her.
- Our board. Our board has also been invaluable. Longstanding board member and former Chair Jo Jarvis retired in November 2018. We consider ourselves very lucky to have been the beneficiary of her devoted and intelligent service for so long. Jo was rightly honored at our 2018 AGM with Honorary Life Membership. We are also lucky to have added two new board members to our number: Dr Sara McLean (a clinical psychologist, academic and author) and Jan Stevens (a long time Carer and Flinders University supervising social worker). These new members along with our existing board (Donna Scott, Kate Harmer, Hastings Chikuse, Terry Plane and Kelly Mathews)- provide outstanding support, stability and guidance to me as Chair, to our CEO and to the organisation as whole. Our constitution insists that over half the board

- are Carers themselves so the board also instrumental in ensuring that we 'keep it real'.
- Our volunteers. Our Peer Support Network has continued to do great work supporting carers by sharing their lived experience. This statewide group was established by Jane Horton our Volunteer Coordinator. Jane retired in December 2019 leaving us with a first class volunteer management framework that we are using to build our volunteer base. In 2018/19 we added volunteer law students, and social work students on placement and aim to keep expanding our volunteer numbers. Please let us know if you have skills to share.
- Our members. It means a lot to all of us at CFKCSA that our members honour us with their support and trust. We take it as a good sign that membership continues to grow, but we don't take it for granted. We get great feedback on our Facebook page and through our annual survey – but are always happy to talk to, and meet with, members who have suggestions for how we might improve or expand our services.
- Our future. We have much to look forward to but can I draw everyone's attention to our biggest up-coming challenge. This year we put up our hands to host the National Foster and Kinship Care conference in SA on 10-12 Sept 2020. It is going to be a fabulous event. Put the dates in your diary. Check dates

It has been a big year – one of enormous growth, for the organisation and for those associated with it. Thank you all for your contribution.

We are grateful to all our volunteers and student placement staff for their ongoing commitment to achieving our mission and vision. We recorded 679 volunteer and student placement hours as at 30/6/2019. This is a phenomenal achievement and we are thankful for the collective skills, knowledge and experience our voluntary workforce provides for our organisation. CF&KC-SA is will continue to develop and provide volunteer and student placement opportunities to progress the future of our organisation.

#### **OUR ACTIVITIES**

#### **ADVOCATE**

CF&KC-SA is committed to consistently promoting the voice of Carers, ensuring our Carers' voices are heard, and for Carers to be acknowledged as an essential part of the child protection system. Our advocacy support, both individual and systemic, provides Cares with the opportunity to participate in decisions that impact children and young people they care for, their lives and their families, and aims to ensure their rights as Carers are promoted and protected.

From the 1st July 2018, we were thrilled to begin delivering the Carer Advocacy Service; a program secured via a rigorous tender process in the previous financial year. The funding now provides formal advocacy for Carers requesting support navigating the best possible outcomes for children and young people in their care. This advocacy occurs at two levels: influencing positive changes to attitudes, policies, systems and laws through **systems advocacy**; and **individual advocacy**, helping Carers have an effective voice in matters that affect them in addition to the children and young people in their care.

During 2018-19 the Carer Advocacy Service recorded approximately **185** occasions of individual advocacy. In delivering the Carer Advocacy Service, our team provided extensive behind the scenes support as part of the delivering the Carer Advocacy Service, including:

- 761 texts sent
- 17 support sessions attended
- 1,247 emails sent
- 30 in person meetings
- 445 messages left
- 1,436 phone conversations

The majority of communication on these issues occurred with DCP staff at local offices and we acknowledge all staff who took the time to review the individual circumstances for Carer families and work towards proactive and positive resolutions.

We thank all our Members and Carers who contacted CF&KC-SA and trusted us to help them have a voice and to share many of their learnings with the broader Carer community.

Our **systems advocacy** continued to be largely focused on issues raised by Carers via our annual survey and information shared from calls to our 1800 number. Areas of main focus included:

- care concerns
- internal and external review process
- accessing and maintaining education for children & young people
- NDIS access and support
- respite entitlements
- Long Term Guardianship (LTG) process

During July 2018 we released our second annual Foster & Kinship Carer Survey asking South Australian Carers to tell us about the challenges and successes of providing family based care. We received 165 responses from Carer households across the state who had provided care to 1,500 children and young people. More Kinship Carers responded than Foster Carers (compared to our 2017 survey) with the top three areas of training and development for Carers, remaining the same; behaviour management (including managing challenging behaviour), helping young people to reach their full potential and dealing with the impact of trauma.

In addition to our individual and systemic advocacy activities, we were involved in many other areas of work across the child protection sector attending over **279 sector meetings**, including regular meetings with Honourable Minister Sanderson, DCP Chief Executive Cathy Taylor and other key stakeholders where we raise common issues and seek improvements to policy, process and legislation including:

We would like to thank all Carers for taking the time to contact our service for support and participating in our annual survey. We have consistently utilised the information provided by Carers to guide our systemic advocacy, the design of our education sessions and our annual Recharge event speakers.

#### **SUPPORT**

CF&KC-SA support services are available to Carers state-wide via phone, email, website and Facebook contact. We aim to complement existing services or meet areas of support or need not currently available across South Australia.

CF&KC-SA focus on **collaboration** and working in a cohesive manner that supports communication between Carers and other parties, whilst ensuring the best interests of the child or young person is at the crux of all decision making.

During the 2018-19 year, CF&KC-SA:

- responded to 1,563 phone calls (inclusive of both 1800 & Carer Advocacy calls)
- replied to 82 general email and website enquiries
- engaged with a growing Facebook community 1,032 Likes and 1,043
   Followers of our page as at 30 June 2019

Listening to our Carers and hearing about their experiences guides our work and service we develop. We stand by the need to acknowledge the importance of the caring role our Carers provide in each child and young person's life, including times of challenge. CF&KC-SA has continued to offer Carers additional benefits through access to **peer support** from experienced Carers – 9 experienced Carers available to have a chat with other Carers across SA, sharing lived experience and support in a confidential manner.

#### CONNECT

Over the past twelve months we were pleased to offer opportunities for Carers to connect through events and activities, together with information about current issues and relevant networks. These events offered a range of opportunities to share the achievements and challenges involved in parenting within a family based care setting and how to access the supports required to develop and sustain Carer families.

Opportunities to connect over the past year include the following events:

- Recharge 2018, our annual event attended by 235 people across 2 sessions. Guests heard from keynote speaker Nathan Wallis on child development and the impact of trauma on the brain plus how to help children and young people recover, together with a communication session from Gary Edwards
- Sponsoring 3 Carer Members to attend the 2018 National Foster & Kinship Care Conference at the Royal Pines Resort, Gold Coast
- Our annual Family Fun Event at the Glenelg Beachouse, attended by 353 Members, who enjoyed the opportunity to socialise with other Carers and involve all members of their family. Children and young people (and some adults!) enjoyed an assortment of amusement rides, arcade games and even the waterslide. Raising Literacy Australia generously provided children's books and novels for our children and young people to take home as a gift on the day
- Conducting reference groups on care concerns and the revision of the Charter of Rights for Carers, for advising DCP on future projects
- Offering over 353 free tickets to Superloop 500, Fringe, Adelaide Festival, WOMAD, SA Museum and Cabaret Festival tickets for Members to enjoy
- Term 3 2018 Regional visit to Mt Gambier and the Limestone Coast

#### **INFORM**

CF&KC-SA believes in the importance of Carers accessing high quality, accurate and relevant information regarding how best to care for their children and young people. We are committed to ensuring the information and resources developed and shared with the Carer community is clear and professional. Accessing appropriate information can lessen the amount of time Carers spend dealing with aspects of the child protection system and keeps the focus on their parenting role with children and young people.

The information and education projects CF&KC-SA presented during 2018/19 included:

- Scoping and hosting three morning tea sessions, sharing information and education regarding post care services, Aboriginal Family Support Services and the Child Abuse Reporting Line, all presented by senior staff from the relevant DCP and stakeholder jurisdictions.
- Publishing three Carer Guides regarding Reviewable Decisions, the South Australian Civil Administrative Tribunal (SACAT) Directions Hearings and the Contact Arrangements Review Panel (CARP) process. Each Carer Guide was developed due to an expressed need for information from the Carer community via our annual survey and calls received through our 1800 number.
- Piloting a Certificate IV in Child & Youth Family Intervention for Foster & Kinship Carers for 31 Carers in collaboration with the Bradford Institute of Education. Our Carer community expressed a keen interest in receiving a qualification in the human service delivery sector, utilising their lived experience as a basis for the education. We were pleased to begin the qualification in May 2019 (graduation date scheduled at Parliament House in February 2020)
- Conducting Facebook livestream sessions for the Carer community to watch and participate in regarding reviewable decisions and the external review process
- Circulating member communications by way of 16 emails, 2 newsletters and 80 Facebook posts regarding pertinent information for the Carer community

#### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### FOR YEAR ENDED 30 June 2019

#### 1. Basis of Accounting

This special purpose financial report has been prepared for distribution to the Board of Management to fulfill the Board of Management's financial accountability requirements under the Associations' Incorporation Act 1985 and CF&KC-SA's Constitution. The Board of Management has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity and, therefore, there is no requirement to apply Australian Accounting Standards and Urgent Issues Group Interpretations in the preparation of this report.

The accounting policies used in the preparation of this report are described below and are, in the opinion of the Board of Management, appropriate to meet the needs of the Board of Management.

- (a) The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting including the historical cost convention and the going concern assumption. Prior to 2018, the financial statements were prepared on a cash basis of accounting.
- (b) The requirements of International Financial Reporting Standards promulgated by the accounting profession do not have mandatory applicability to CF&KC-SA Incorporated in relation to the year ended 30 June 2019 because CF&KC-SA is not a "reporting entity" as defined therein. CF&KC-SA has prepared the financial report in accordance with the following applicable Australian Accounting Standards and Urgent Issues Group Interpretations:

AASB 101 "Presentation of Financial Statements"

AASB 108 "Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors";

AASB 110 "Events after the Balance Sheet Date"; and

AASB 1031 "Materiality".

No other Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations or authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

#### (c) Computers & Accessories

Computers & Accessories are recorded at cost, less accumulated depreciation.

Any gain or loss on the disposal of assets is determined as the difference between the written-down value of the asset at the time of disposal and the proceeds from disposal, and is included in the results in the year of disposal.

#### (d) Depreciation

Assets are depreciated over their useful lives. Depreciation is provided on a straight-line value basis on computers and accessories at rates calculated to allocate the cost, less estimated residual value at the end of the useful lives of the assets, against revenue over those estimated useful lives.

An asset is depreciated for a full year in the year the asset is purchased or commissioned.

#### (e) Income Tax

CF&KC-SA is exempt from income tax under the provisions of Section 50-10 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

#### (f) Revenue Recognition

CF&KC-SA funds are exclusively sourced from The Department of Families and Communities, SA. CF&KC-SA has no other revenue sources, not even annual membership fees.

Grant income is brought to account in CF&KC-SA's Profit and Loss Statement in the period it is received, and unspent grant funds are still recognised as earned income in the year received.

#### (g) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised ex GST, since CF&KC-SA was registered for GST effective 1 January 2017.

#### (h) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The Board of Management evaluated estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained externally and within CF&KC-SA.

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#### **OUR FUTURE**

CF&KC-SA will continue to focus on the increasing need and delivery of the Carer Advocacy Service during this coming year. The Carer Advocacy Service has experienced positive results for Carers accessing our advocacy, information and support from our team, with no two cases the same. We encourage all approved Carers to continue to access our Carer Advocacy Service as we are committed to ensuring the Carer voice is heard and represented.

CF&KC-SA will be also be working towards Recommendation 117, funding the Carer Advocacy Service to develop education material that clearly describes Carer rights regarding their contribution to decision making and their rights of review regarding decisions. Outcomes of this recommendation will include additional Carer Guides, information sessions and support.

In addition to the education funding, we will also undertake a short legal project, funded by The Law Foundation. With the assistance of a Legal Consultant, CF&KC-SA will develop education materials, Carer Guides and templates connected legislation and the legal requirements within the child protection sector. Our Legal Consultant will train our team in para-legal skills, specifically for use within a tribunal setting.

CF&KC-SA will continue the partnership with Bradford Institute, delivering the Diploma in Community Services to approved Carers with lived experience. As part of this initiative, we will explore the potential of workforce pathways and support for our graduate students to ensure their skills, knowledge and experience are utilised professionally within the child protection sector.

Last but by no means by least, we are proud to host the National Foster & Kinship Care Conference in 2020 here in Adelaide. The Conference will focus on key issues facing our Carers across the nation, specifically regarding areas of education, disability & NDIS, behaviour management/challenging behaviours and Carer mental health & wellbeing. We are excited to utilise the information from the Conference to guide future work, both at a state and national level.

#### **OUR MEMBERS**

Members play an important part in shaping the work of CF&KC-SA and improving the system for Carer families across South Australia. The support of our Members ensures we advocate on the most relevant issues facing our Carers, and we can speak with confidence to the issues that need improvement, and the services that need to be developed.
